\triangleright	Heaven is not Remote – it is immediate.	
\triangleright	Heaven is not something we wait for until we die.	
\triangleright	Heaven IS now, just barely out of our range of senses.	
\triangleright	John's vision of heaven is not the promise of anything other than what we have already

>	John changes the wording the future tense of "to"

	Instead, The God who was, and is and is TO COME.	
	God is a not a God of an unknown future.	
	God is the ONE who PROMISES to return – to	
	Shift from metaphysics of time to history of salvation.	
	God will Come!
